Six main characters' names are Nick Adams, Sam, George, Ole Anderson, Al, Max, and one minor character like the customer, a silent character who observes the event.

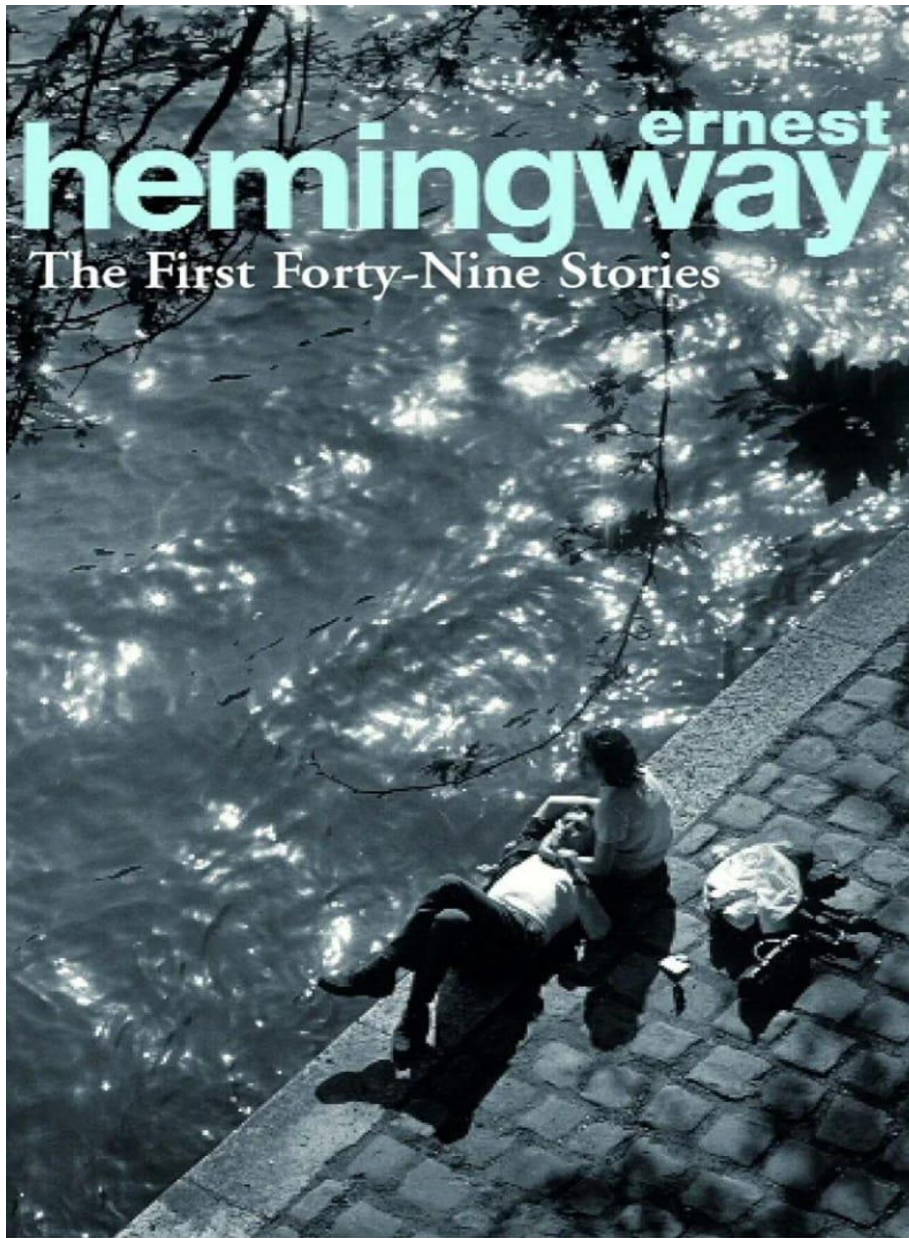

The story also explores fear and courage, the contrast between Nick's concern and acceptance. It highlights different ways people handle adversity. Finally, Hemingway's use of subtle tension, illustration of how much can be conveyed through what is left unsaid.

Hemingway's minimalist style, known as the iceberg theory, is at its finest in the killers; he provides surface details but leaves much of the story's meaning beneath the surface, encouraging readers to interpret the character motivations and emotions on their own.

This story is a testament to his genius and serves as a reminder of how literature can make a reflection of life's unpredictability and challenges.
